Stunningwildlife

Coral Harbour is a crossroad for arctic wildlife. A simple daytrip will reveal a diverse range of species - polar bear; beluga, bowhead and narwhal whales; harbour, ringed and bearded seals; walrus; arctic wolf; arctic and red fox; lemmings and more.

Animal and bird watchers alike find a rich tapestry of life at the island's two vast bird sanctuaries. which have a combined area of almost 170,000 hectares (420,000 acres). Countless bird species nest and migrate here.

Depending on the season you visit in, you may tour by boat, dog sled, snowmobile, ATV or foot. From day trips to extended excursions, you will quickly come to appreciate the skills and knowledge of our experienced local guides.

Hunting and fishing paradise

Explore the Lost City of the North, about 60 km from Coral Harbour. This archeological site is all that remains of the Thule Sallirmuit people who at one time populated the island.

Also near Coral Harbour, a popular swimming creek holds a surprise. Fossilized coral, dating thousands of years, can be easily seen when walking through the clear water.

History, frozen and fossilized

Southampton Island maintains a healthy herd of about 15,000 caribou, making for a consistently enjoyable, successful hunt. Only 16 km (10 miles) from Coral Harbour, outpost camps are set up for a wide range of hunting and fishing, including polar bear, seal, walrus, beluga and arctic char.

Art of the land

Many of the 850 people living in Coral Harbour survive off their traditional hunting and art. Often the two merge, and the animals they hunt become the art they make. Out of bone, skin and stone, the art captures images of life in the north, including the animals which they depend on. Visitors have access to prints, wallhangings and traditional clothing plus internationally sought carvings.
